1980 — CYPRESS COLLEGE

F100. JACK MATONIS (Attorney-at-Law/tax protester). *Individual Counter-Government Action as a Means to Future Liberty.* (60 min.) Jailed for his refusal to pay Income Tax, Matonis talks about "Monkey Wrench Law," describing ways that citizens can achieve justice, and suggests various methods for obtaining favorable court decisions.

F101. PROF. JOHN HOSPERS (author/lecturer/educator). *The Future of Democracy.* (60 min.) Professor of Philosophy at USC, Hospers discusses the problems of a democracy and its pitfalls when it violates individual rights

F102. DEBATE: LOWELL PONTE vs. PROF. JOHN WIENER. *Libertarianism or Marxism: Which Direction for the Future?* Moderated by Roy Begley. (60 min.)

This debate shows the deep chasm between the two philosophies. Wiener contends that there are no isolated individuals, only classes and social structures. Ponte, a freelance writer, argues that theoretical Marxism leads only to dictatorship.

F103. DEBATE: GEORGE SMITH vs. JEFFREY JOHNSON. *Libertarianism or Conservatism: The Future of Victimless Crimes and Religion.* Moderated by L.A. Times reporter Bud Lembke. (60 min.)

Smith, an atheist, advocates voluntarism, in contrast to Johnson who would enforce moral obligation and an instilled sense of duty (Johnson is a theist).

F104. ROBERT ANTON WILSON (author of *Iluminatus* and other works). *Neophobes and Neophiles: The Futurist Dialectic.* (60 min.)

"Fear of change vs. curiosity and exploration" is how Wilson explains the title of his talk, and from there he explores the ramifications of the rate of change on our current attitudes. A delightful, nostalgic trip, as well as a humorous projection of our future.

F105. J. NEIL SCHULMAN. (author of *Alongside Night*). *Picturing Libertarian Futures.* (60 min.)

Schulman begins with a "story" to illustrate the theme of his talk. Very salty and colorful.

F106. ROBERT LeFEVRE: BANQUET (Founder of The Freedom Schools and Rampart College and author/lecturer) *A Tribute to LeFevre by Nine Prominent Libertarians.* (90 min.)

On hand to share their experiences, favorite

anecdotes, and fond recollections of a much-loved figure, are Richard and Caroline Deyo, Harry Hoiles, among others.

F107. CARL NICOLAI (inventor). *The Future of Electronic Communication.* (60 min.) Electronic devices are involved in changing our present reality, but the ramifications of the new communications pose a threat to us just as the government does.

F108. PANEL: JOHN PUGSLEY & ANTHONY HARGIS (both are authors on economic survival tactics). *The Future of The Economy: Alternatives and Methods for Economic Survival.* (60 min.) James Gallagher is moderator of this two person discussion on alternate economic futures and ways to achieve the ultimate free market solutions.

F109. KARL HESS (author and presidential speech-writer) *Liberty as a Do-It-Yourself Project.* (60 min.)

A delightful, funny talk about "action" taking precedence over "words" on such issues as the economy, politics and so-called ecological solutions. The Libertarians' role as the "Marines": do it now—no time for being "hermits."

F110. DEBATE: SAMUEL E. KONKIN III (editor of *The New Libertarian*) vs. MANUEL KLAUSNER (Attorney-at-Law). *Counter-Economics or Political Action: Which Direction for the Future?* Moderated by Roy Begley. (60 min.)

Konkin, the advocate of counter-economics in this debate, begins by proposing a "do nothing" approach when it comes to registering for anything! Klausner counters with a defense of political action. This debate is exceptional because both participants are eloquent in their individual oratorical styles when defending their points of view

F111. ARTHUR LAFFER, (USC Prof. of Business Economics, and lecturer). *The Laffer Curve and the Future of Supply and Demand in Our Society.* (60 min.)

Laffer explores various situations involving current so-called solutions to our present economic crisis. A very articulate speaker with refreshing alternatives.

F112. DAVID BERGLAND, (Attorney-at-Law and the 1984 Libertarian Party presidential candidate). *Foreign Policy: The Future of Non-Interventionism.* (60 min.)

Bergland covers such topics as international free trade vs. protectionism, self-determination, defense, and the relationship between domestic and foreign policies. A

soft-spoken orator with clearly conceived and delineated libertarian solutions to some critical dilemmas.

F113. PANEL: BOB MCGINLEY (author) and **LINDA ABRAMS** (Attorney-at-Law). *The Future of Liberty and Alternative Lifestyles*. (60 min.)

Bob McGinley describes the direction of personal relationships and how society influences the structures of these relationships. Linda Abrams adds pertinent insights into the legal aspects of seeking alternative lifestyles when you wish to exclude the state.

F114. SANDY SHAW (co-author, with Durk Pearson, of *Life Extension*). *Life Extension, Intelligence Increase and the Effects of Government Intervention*. (60 min.)

Ms. Shaw discusses the reasons why life-spans are increasing for humans and animals. An exciting discourse on her recent discoveries, including up-to-date information on how to raise one's I.Q.

F115. ROBERT LeFEVRE (Workshop Talk) *Justice, Part I*. (60 min.)

"Justice is the arrangement that ensues in a relationship between persons in which the agreement that was voluntarily entered into by all the parties is kept in all respects, and not violated; and that is the only justice that there is." LeFevre's workshop evolves from this opening statement illustrating that simple truth.

F116. ROBERT LeFEVRE (Workshop Talk) *Justice, Part II*. (60 min.)

In this second part of the Justice Workshop, LeFevre describes in a colorful, articulate manner the ramifications of contracts, killings, etc. The interaction with the audience is a highlight of the tape.

1981 — CAL STATE UNIV., LONG BEACH

F117. BANQUET TRIBUTE: JOHN HOSPERS (USC Professor of Philosophy, and author of *Libertarianism, Understanding the Arts*, and other fine works). *Banquet: Tribute to the Early Years, With Special Recognition to Prof. John Hospers*. (90 min.)

Includes speeches by **Robert Poole**, **Don Ernsberger**, **David Walter**, **Manuel Klausner**, **Leonard Liggio**, **Shawn Steel**, and **William Susel**. A good-humoured evening filled with comradery and favorite stories of the FOF Con beginnings.

F118. JACK MATONIS (Attorney-at-Law). *A Technological Rebellion against Government*. (60 min.)

Taxes are the topic of the day, by a highly dramatic courtroom attorney. Very entertain-

ing, with answers to questions that many tax-payers (and non-tax-payers) are interested in.

F119. PANEL: FRANK FORTKAMP & ALLAN E. HARRISON (authors and educators). *Education: Practical Approaches for the Future*. (60 min.)

Restructuring the public school system is the main theme of this discussion, which offers alternatives of special interest to the free-market advocate.

F120. KARL HESS (author of *Dear America* and *Playboy* article "The Death of Politics"; and presidential speech writer). *The Nuts and Bolts of Technology and Freedom*. (60 min.)

Hess, in a charming and witty talk, suggests that actions on a local—not vocal—level are an effective method for attaining a free society.

F121. PANEL: JOHN HOSPERS, ROBERT LeFEVRE, and GEORGE SMITH. *Justice and Liberty in a Free Society*. (Two 60 min. tapes)

Three approaches on a vital issue, by a highly distinguished panel. Very lively discussion.

F122. ROBERT POOLE (editor/publisher of *Reason Magazine*). *Unconventional Approaches to Property Rights*. (60 min.)

Poole discusses the problems of obscure property, (i.e., who owns the airwaves?) and offers solutions to such questions.

F124. LEE & JOYCE SHULMAN (both are practicing psychologists). *Self-Liberation: Freedom from Within*. (60 min.)

A refreshing approach to self-knowledge; amply illustrated, with demonstrative interaction with the audience.

F125. PANEL: FRED SCHNAUBELT (San Diego City Councilman), and **DENNIS BROWN** (California State Assemblyman). *Looking at Government from the Inside*. (60 min.)

Two elected officials discuss their efforts to work within the system to make those changes they think are necessary for our society. You be the judge.

F126. TIMOTHY LEARY (author/activist). *The Technology of Freedom*. (60 min.)

If you love humour mixed with intellect and sprinkled with delightful anecdotes—get this tape! As always, this speaker is controversial and fun.

F127A & B. PANEL: DAVID FRIEDMAN, LOWEL PONTE, SAMUEL E. KONKIN III and LEONARD LIGGIO. *Foreign Policy: How Should America be Defended?* (Two 60 min. tapes).

An illustrious panel offers new ideas and practical solutions to this critical issue of the day.

F128A & B. PANEL: JACK MATONIS, RON MATHESON, ARMEN CONDO and A. J. LOWERY (tax resistance experts). *The Current Anti-Tax Movement*. (Two 60 min. tapes) Each panelist has had experiences in tax avoidance and run-ins with the IRS. Their experiences are shared with us in a succinct manner. Information that is always timely.

1982 — CAL STATE UNIV., LONG BEACH

F129A & B. (Two 60 min. Tapes) BANQUET TRIBUTE: NATHANIEL BRANDEN (psychologist/author). *Tribute to Nathaniel Branden by David Bergland, Roger Callahan, Manuel Klausner, and Devers Branden*. Also, **THE FIRST ANNUAL MENCKEN AWARDS. Jeff Rigenbach is MC.**

Good natured humour and reminiscences highlight the distinguished speakers' personal contributions.

The Mencken Awards are presented for the first time here, and have become an annual tradition at the FOF Con.

F130. ROBERT LeFEVRE (author and founder of The Freedom Schools and Rampart College). *Keynote Speech: The 1982 FOF Con.* (30 min.)

Always eloquent, Mr. LeFevre welcomes the attendees graciously and warmly. His wisdom and knowledge are much in evidence in this fine tape.

F131. JACK MATONIS (Attorney-at-Law/tax rebel). *A Radical, New Approach to Opposing Government: The Weapons for Liberty*. (60 min.)

In this tape, Dr. Matonis discusses his experiences with the IRS and offers suggestions to the audience on how to help themselves in tax matters.

F132. WENDY McELROY (author/feminist). *Women Against the State*. (60 min.)

A well-researched dissertation on the attitudes and the ploys of the state regarding women in this society. Emphasis on women in the libertarian movement of the 19th century: an historical perspective long ignored by socialist writers.

The only drawback to this tape is technical: the acoustics aren't too friendly to Ms. McElroy's voice, but it's worth listening to anyway.

F133. GARY HUDSON (science writer). *The Privatization of Space* (60 min.)

In this talk, Mr. Hudson discusses his prior 13 years experience in privatizing space and his approaches to various corporations regarding their participation in this endeavor.

F134. DOUGLAS CASEY (author of *Crisis Investing* and *The International Man*). *Why the Great Depression of the 1980s will be a Good Thing*. (60 min.)

Holding on to real goods, among other suggestions, is a good way to ride-out this inflationary period, according to Mr. Hudson. He also explains the causes and effects of inflation. Very informative.

F135. DR. THOMAS SZASZ (psychiatrist/author of *Ceremonial Chemistry*, *The Ethics of Psychoanalysis*, etc.). *The Psychiatric Will: Resolving the Dilemma of Involuntary Interventions*. (90 min.)

The content of this speech focuses mainly on the issues of state interference involving our mental health; the blatant use of institutions to censor dissidents. Suggests a form of "living will" to guard against psychiatric abuses.

This tape is difficult to hear because of the acoustics, but well worth the effort.

F136. DR. JOHN HOSPERS (USC Professor of Philosophy and author of *Libertarianism*). *An Evaluation of the Reagan Administration* (the first term). (60 min.)

Since this is dated material, it is interesting in that we can now evaluate and compare the changes in the administration over a period of time. Dr. Hospers begins by citing some positive benefits of the administration on "our" domestic policy.

F137. BARBARA BRANDEN (author/lecturer) *Who is Ayn Rand?* (60 min.)

Ms. Branden sets out to acquaint us with the ramifications of cultism within Ayn Rand's followers of Objectivism. With excellent oratorical skills, she guides us through some typical misconceptions and presents some delightful insights.

F138. JEFF RIGGENBACH (radio commentator/journalist). *Decadence and the Ideology of Freedom*. (60 min.)

This illustrative talk presents a history of decadence in correlation with the advances of technology. Very well-informed speaker.

F139A & B. (One 60 min./one 90 min. tape) DEBATE: GEORGE SMITH (voluntaryist/author) vs. **THOMAS BARTMAN** (President of the Los Angeles City Board of Education). *Should Public Education Be Abolished?* Moderated by Manuel S. Klausner.

This debate turns into a comedy by virtue of the extreme differences in the point of view of the debaters. George Smith presents himself as a thorough researcher while

Thomas Bartman comes across as a smooth politician who never does address the issue. Very controversial, especially with the audience.

F140. JOHN PUGSLEY (author). *The Domsday Factor*. (60 min.)

Cites various instances of involvement with foreign governments that have created with our present economic situations, and shows the real causes of inflation.

F141A & B. (two 60 min. tapes) DEBATE: JEFFREY ROGERS HUMMEL (writer) and **PROF. DAVID FRIEDMAN** (author/Prof. of Economics). *Should America have a Military Force for Defense?*

Both speakers have a fine command of the English language and a stunning knowledge of relevant facts. They showcase the issue eloquently. Informative and timely.

F142A & B. (two 60 min. tape) DR. NATHANIEL and E. DEVERS BRANDEN (psychologists). *Honoring The Self: A Participatory Workshop*.

Getting everyone involved in this talk was the object here. One can use this tape to perform home therapy and problem-solving. Needless to say their good humour colors the session spectacularly.

F143. JACK MATONIS: WORKSHOP TALK (attorney/tax specialist). *New Approaches to Opposing Government, Part I*. (60 min.)

Another exciting talk on his battle with the tax collectors and things one can do to save themselves from the pitfalls of tax-paying.

F144A & B. JACK MATONIS: WORKSHOP TALK, CONTINUED. (Two 60 min. tapes)

1983 — LONG BEACH CITY COLLEGE

F145. GEORGE SMITH (author/lecturer). *Keynote Speech: 1983 FOF Con.* (30 min. tape)

Articulate as always, George Smith gives us an historical insight into the issues of the day. Very informative.

F146. LEE and JOYCE SHULMAN (psychologists). *Adventure in Freedom*. (60 min.)

They offer methods to practice now for achieving personal freedom. A therapy session to illustrate the title of this talk.

F147. ROBERT POOLE (author/ editor of *Reason Magazine*). *A New Approach To National Defense*. (60 min.)

Mr. Poole presents a well-researched argument on this subject. His knowledge of the latest in arms technology is one of the highlights of this talk.

F148. KARL HESS (author/presidential speech writer). *Survivalism and Liberty*. (60 min.)

Again, Karl Hess delights his audience with his witticisms and anecdotes, while informing us on how to survive in this country.

F149. PANEL: MURRAY ROTHBARD, ROBERT LeFEVRE *The Nature of Justice*. (90 min.)

Two brilliant speakers are featured in this timely discussion. Each presents a viewpoint backed by years of experience and research. One of the finest we have to offer.

F150. HENRY HOLZER (Attorney-at-Law author). *Sweet Land of Liberty?*. *The Walter Polovchak Case and Constitutional Law*. (60 min.)

A fascinating discussion of the effect of freedom on a young Russian defector and the legal processes which were hindering his bid for freedom. By the Constitutional attorney who undertook his defense.

F151. BUTLER SHAFFER (journalist). *The Institutional Causes of Conflict*. (60 min.)

The idea of accepting institutional solutions to our problems today is refuted by Mr. Shaffer in a most knowledgeable and informative speech.

F152A & B. (two 60 min. tapes) TRIBUTE BANQUET: MURRAY ROTHBARD and THE 1983 MENCKEN AWARDS. Jeff Riggenschbach, MC.

On hand to toast Murray Rothbard is a sparkling array of libertarian luminaries.

Also, the Free Press Association presents the H. L. Mencken Awards.

F153. THOMAS HAZLETT (author/lecturer). *Supply-Side Economics: A Critical Appraisal*. (60 min.)

Mixing humour with keen observation, Mr. Hazlett discusses Reaganomics, current policies and the cosmetic effects as well as the inevitable outcomes.

F154. BEN SASWAY (draft resister). *The Draft: Why I Did Not Register*. (60 min.)

The presentation by this young man went unmatched at this conference. He was inspired by his position on the draft, and thus touched all who were attending the convention. His presence and ability to communicate were exceptional. A very special tape.

F155. BARBARA BRANDEN (lecturer/author). *Ayn Rand: The Charisma of Reason*. (60 min.)

As always the sound of Ms. Branden's voice compels the listener with its fine resonance. In this talk she touches upon a facet of Ms. Rand's personality that is not generally known, and which is graciously shared with the audience.

F156. IRWIN SCHIFF (author/lecturer/tax rebel). *The Untax Movement*. (90 min.)

Irwin Schiff was not able to speak at the 1982 FOF Con. because he was incarcerated. In his talk, at this conference, he shares with us some practical methods by which to keep more of our income away from the IRS.

F157. LOWELL PONTE (author/journalist/lecturer). *Science and Socialism: Government Funding on New Frontier Ideas*. (60 min.)

Giving historical examples, Ponte brings us through the evolution of Science vs. the state in a most eloquent talk. A speaker with clarity and well-researched material.

F158. WENDY McELROY (lecturer/writer). *War vs. Libertarianism*. (60 min.)

"War is the health of the state" is the quotation which as an opening serves to illustrate the content of Ms. McElroy's speech. As always, she gives us a succinct and knowledgeable dissertation.

WORKSHOP SPEECHES

FW600. KARL HESS. Workshop at CSULB Philosophy Association on Oct. 21, 1983: *Vision of A Well Earth*. (90 min.)

FW601. GEORGE ORWELL SOCIETY with KARL HESS. *Why Reagan is the Biggest Fascist Since FDR*. (60 min.) **RICHARD DEYO** *The Art of Non-Voting*. (60 min.)

FW603. CARL WATNER & GEORGE SMITH *Voluntaryist Workshop*. (60 min.)

1984 — CAL STATE UNIV., LONG BEACH

F159. MANUEL KLAUSNER (attorney/Senior Editor of *Reason* magazine). *Keynote Speech: 1984 FOF Con.* (60 min.)

A polished speaker and a recognized leader in the movement, Mr. Klausner reminds us that "this is 1984!" Thought provoking.

F160. PROF. TIBOR MACHAN (author/lecturer/teacher). *Libertarianism vs. Marxism*. (60 min.)

With an abundance of information, this talk educates throughout. Dr. Machan's presence as a speaker is an added bonus.

F161. JAY SNELSON (lecturer). *Attenuation of War, Optimization of Peace*. (60 min.)

An accomplished speaker, Mr. Snelson shares his experience as a teacher, while he informs us with his scientific knowledge and conclusions.

F163. ROBERT LeFEVRE (author/lecturer/teacher). *Do You Really Want a Free Society?* (60 min.)

Always gracious, Mr. LeFevre delights us with more of his anecdotes and vast knowledge of history. He talks to us as only he can talk to us: government abolishment is not the immediate answer.

F164. PROF. BERNARD SIEGAN (educator/lecturer). *Economic Liberties*. (60 min.)

Prof. Siegan begins by discussing contracts and court protection. Is there protection? What can citizens do ensure their freedoms in this matter? Cites historical cases to illustrate this very informative talk.

F165A & B. (two 90 min. tapes) BANQUET TRIBUTE TO AYN RAND and THE MENCKEN AWARDS, Jeff Riggenschbach, among other notables, speaking.

Author Ruth Hill and others share with us some personal experiences with the late Ayn Rand. A very moving tribute by all who participated in this historical moment.

F166. TOM HAZLETT (journalist/teacher/lecturer). *Presidential Politics: The Buffoonery*. (60 min.)

Mr. Hazlett's sense of humour leads the listener through a colorful dissertation of our political traditions. Lampoonics is the theme throughout this tape. If you like to laugh, listen!

F167. RUTH HILL (author, *Hanta Yo*). *Ayn Rand Meets Hiawatha*. (60 min.)

As the title suggests, Ms. Hill tells of her experiences with Ms. Rand, and of her dealings with the media and academia and their reception of her best-selling, epic novel, *Hanta Yo*. Particularly relevant.

F168. JACK WHEELER (author/explorer/adventurer/lecturer). *The New Revolution in the Third World*. (60 min.)

This man started his world-wide exploring at the ripe old age of 14. Just the introduction to his talk is worth the tape. The content is of course just as remarkable, as the speaker takes us mentally to Afghanistan, Angola, Asia and Central America. His first-hand knowledge of the freedom movements in the Third World reflects his philosophy and tenacity—a must for anyone who wants sound, vivid reporting.

F169. PANEL: Leonard Liggio, John Hospers and George Smith. *How to Remain Free and Prevent War*. (60 min.)

Quite a discussion for a 60-minute tape. Each member of the illustrious panel gives us timely insights into, and advice on, a most serious topic. Three of the finest speakers here.

F170. BARRY REID (entrepreneur/author/lecturer). *Creating Personal Privacy*. (60 min.)

The content of this tape is invaluable to the person who wants to keep big brother off his/her back. Mr. Reid has a whole list of

publications available to illustrate his points. This tape is very informative—a clear presentation of “how to’s” for liberty.

FREELAND I — 1983

FL1. WENDY McELROY, *History of 19th Century Libertarian Communities.*

Wendy McElroy is a clear thinker who researches her material thoroughly. This is a course in history which the listener will truly appreciate regarding the nature of men and women and their efforts to be free.

SPENCER MacCALLUM, (side two) *Lessons Learned from the Atlantis Experiment.*

Contractual agreements or “new constitutions” are the topics that Mr. MacCallum opens his talk with. Then he launches into the story of Atlantis—an attempt to build a man-made island in the Carribean—and its conception, as well as a discussion of the philosopher Ayn Rand who inspired it. (A 90 min. tape for both talks.)

FL2. JAMES GALLAGHER, *Independence Movement for California's Coastal Islands.*

Mailing notices of advisement to secede to the residents of Catalina Island is just one of the positive actions taken by Mr. Gallagher to further the cause of freedom. His talk is interesting and truly addresses the issue of the conference.

ANTHONY HARGIS, (side two) *Individual Secession.*

Mr. Hargis presents concrete solutions in this talk about taking charge of our lives. He practices what he preaches and sets a good example for those who need to make some positive moves towards freedom. (A 60 min. tape for both talks.)

FL3. GARY HUDSON, *Freeports of Earth: The Case for Floating Islands.* (60 min.)

Mr. Hudson's approach is unique and refreshing. He cites several examples of the mechanics of the “islands” and presents feasible ideas which can be implemented right now.

FL4. ROBERT LeFEVRE, *We Did it Before.*

A humorous and sincere comparison is made of the ideas thus far presented in the above tapes! This prefaces his remarks to us on the subject he has chosen for this conference. Mr. LeFevre recounts his experiences in such efforts as developing the Freedom School in Colorado, and offers us sound advice based on them. As usual—refreshing and endearing.

SARAH FOSTER, (side two) *Why the New Hebrides Experiment Failed.*

Ms. Foster presents several reasons for the demise of this effort to establish a libertarian society in a Third World nation—they are essentially the same causes which limit

our effectiveness in our own culture. (The above tape is 90 min. for both talks.)

FL5. PANEL: Samuel E. Konkin III, Jeff Hummel and Carol Moore, *How to Protect a Free, Non-Government Community from Governments.* (90 min.)

Sam Konkin begins with the comment: “Anarcho-Zionism, the search for the promised gulch . . .” to let the audience be aware of his position. He enlarges on his ideas on agorist capitalism. Carol Moore follows with her solutions which encompass “immense community awareness and participation in defense”, and illustrates her views—good material here. Mr. Hummel's approach is to involve the community as well. He cites such communities as Hong Kong that have sound economies, and discusses and the reasons why.

FREELAND II — 1984

FL6. BARRY REID, *How to Achieve a New World of Privacy.* (60 min.)

Computerized data files are a direct threat to us today, and Barry Reid offers us some tactics to deal with that threat. Credit reports, insurance companies, etc., are all part of the “paper trip.” He discusses alternate identities—a must for anyone who wants to remain as free as possible.

FL7. TERRY SAVAGE, *A Realist's Plan for Building a Free Community in Space.* (60 min.)

2025 is the target date for the “colony”—the proposed community in space. The outline of this project is presented in a very practical terms.

FL8. WILLIAM R. POZZI, *Where to Find Liberty Today: The Best Places to Live.* (60 min.)

The best way to select a free-er place to live is to make lists of criteria, such as climate, male/female ratio, political aspects, etc. Lots of information here—a real aid for those who want to make a change.

FL9. POUL ANDERSON, *Promise and Problems.* (60 min.)

A joke sets the tone for Mr. Anderson's well-received talk. As technology advances in our lifetime our opportunities increase. These and other criteria are well-presented.

FL10. CONRAD SCHNELKER, *Liberty World: A Floating Free City of the Future.* (60 min.)

With the quotation from the Statue of Liberty, Mr. Schnelker sets the stage for his unique idea for new cities.

FL11. GARY HUDSON, *Liberty from the Pacific Rim to Space.* (A 40 min. talk on a 60

min. tape.)

Appreciative of all efforts that have been made by libertarians, and even by Republicans and Democrats, in promoting freedom, Mr. Hudson takes us through time. China and Japan's influence on our present culture are among the interesting points raised. Space is the ultimate and unlimited frontier.

FL12. WAYNE WHITE, *Space Law: Real Property Rights in Outer Space.* (60 min.)

Mr. White gives a detailed description of property rights as they are applied in space. His examples solicit many interesting questions from the audience.

F171. A & B DEBATE: George Smith vs David Ramsey Steele “*Natural Rights*”. (Two 60 min. tapes)

George Smith starts out by defining “rights” and brings up “objections” to set the tone and continues on with the statement that “all theories are the product of the human mind!” David Ramsey Steele counterattacks by trying to establish an ethical views by illustrating his view with a minimum wage analogy. Both debaters have a distinctly different approach to this subject.

F172.A & B PANEL: George Smith, Marshall Fritz, Jeff Rigganbach, David Ramsay Steele, & Linda Abrams “*Building A Free Society: Prospects & Possibilities*.” (Two 60 min. tapes).

Included in this tape is a recorded telephone message from Paul Jacob, a scheduled speaker, who was incarcerated in a federal prison and unable to attend this conference. The panel speakers, all distinguished, brought many fine examples of their thinking to their discussion.

F173. Scott McKeown “*Guardian Angels: Vigilantes or Protectors*”(60 min.)

This speaker leads into his discussion with remarks about “the absurd state of the criminal justice system.” He then relates to personal experiences in the field, which all adds up to a very enlightening 60 minutes.

F174. ROBERT LEFEVRE “*A Revolting Proposal*”. (60 min.)

LeFevre begins with humour and anecdotes about the Libertarian Party and continues with the thoughts on how to improve conditions for human beings and proceeds to illustrate his talk.

F175. BARRY REID “*Guerrilla Capitalism*”. (60 min.)

Tagged “Hero to The Underworld” by the TV program *60 Minutes*, Barry tells us that he is “just a capitalist.” He then proceeds to inform us of the many ways in which people can insure their privacy.

F176. JEFF RIGGENBACH “*Tales of The Dark Side of Prohibition and the Stupidity of Government*.” (60 min.)

The Mencken Awards, as usual, were an entertaining as well as informative preface to a delightful evening with Karl Hess.

F178. ROBERT POOLE "Why Deregulate Public Utilities?" (60 min.)

Mr. Poole delivers a very informative speech with practical solutions pertaining to the topic, some of which are successfully being implemented around the country.

F179. JEFF HUMMELL "History of Con-scription." (60 min.)

A history lesson which covers little-known facts about America's early militia of volunteers. A well-documented talk.

F180. KARL HESS "Liberty's Lifestyles." (60 min.)

Tools, being the result ideas, have changed society as much as ideas do, says Mr. Hess. As always, this speaker encourages the audience to consider alternate ways to achieve freedom from tyranny of governments. His present lifestyle is an example.

A former member of the Socialist Party of Great Britain, Mr. Steele presents us with views about the rise and fall of Marxism in Europe and around the world.

F183. STATEBUSTER'S CONTEST "Evils of the State." (60 min.)

All the participants in this contest were excellent speakers. Marshal Fritz was the winner. The other two contestants were Howard Hinman and Dagny Sharon).

F184. NORMA JEAN ALMODOVAR (Workshop) "From Cop to Call Girl." (60 min.)

Ms Almodovar worked for the Los Angeles police department for 10 years and she states that there was so much corruption going on that she was ashamed to work for them. Since then she has been harassed, entrapped and convicted for pandering as she attempted to publish a book she wrote on the subject. REMANENT TAPES

Below are tapes from one-day speeches and the Voluntaryist Conference.

R270-A, B, C, D, E, and F. ROBERT LEFEVRE
The Anatomy of the State. (A set of six 60 min. tapes.)

This series of lectures was given over a three evening period in January of 1983. In this lecture series LeFevre reveals the nature of government, how it was created and its preception through the centuries. This is a finely detailed desertation and is highly recommended as an educational tool for anyone who collects his works.

R275-A, B, C, D, E, and F. ROBERT LEFEVRE
The Nature of Money.

(A set of six tapes, four 60 min., and two 90 min. tapes.)

What is money? How did it evolve? LeFevre gives a historical view of private and public money, inflation/deflation, and the concept of "subjective value." LeFevre gives examples where an English King attempted to substitute junk metal for silver in the kingdoms' coins and what resulted. This series of lectures was given over a three evening period in September of 1982.

R300. GEORGE SMITH (lecturer, writer and author), *Does Public Education Educate?* (A 90 min. tape).

This lecture was given at Santa Ana College in 1978. George Smith gives a libertarian analysis of state education. He argues for the end to government's role in education. He proceeds to examine the history of state education, noting that U.S. politicians in the 1830s argued for government controlled education in an effort to make better citizens of students, and not to increase literacy, since that was already considered high.

R301. JOHN PUGSLEY (author, publisher, lecturer), *Common Sense Economics.* (A 90 min. tape).

This lecture was given at Santa Ana College in 1979. Mr. Pugsley tells us that he is a reader and an observer and a student graduate of the Free Enterprise Institute. His talk leads us into territorial history and the folklore that colors the populaces beliefs. A refreshing approach to a complicated subject.

R302 A & B. JACK MATONIS (attorney, lecturer), *Constitutional Law and the Tax Revolt.* (Two 90 min. tapes).

This lecture by Matonis is very informative and was given at Santa Ana College in 1979. A colorful and energetic speaker, Matonis tells the listener about events that government has caused in legal proceeding and

taxes. He suggest certain investment alternatives that might help the investor avoid high taxes

R303 A & B. SAMUEL KONKIN III (writer, lecturer), *Counter Economics.* (Two 60 min. tapes).

Konkin covers a great deal of territory in these tapes: libertarian strategies vs politics, gradualism vs principle, statism vs counter-economics.

R304. DEBATE: ERIC GARRIS (lecturer & writer) vs **PROF. KENT** (Prof. at UCI) *Pros and Cons—Sen. John Briggs Initiative* (A 90 min. tape)

Known as the anti-gay-rights initiative brought forth by California state Senator Briggs, poposition 6 was debated at Cal. State Fullerton in 1978. Senator Briggs was scheduled to debate Eric Garris, a leader in the Libertarian Party. Instead, Prof. Kent sat in for Sen. Briggs. (A law suit was filed against Briggs after the debate). Moderated by Ken Grubbs, Jr., the the debate became a classical libertarian vs conservative struggle. At one point, Eric Garris is asked why he opposes murder. Garris says because the "victim did not consent to it."

R305 A & B. DEBATE: GEORGE SMITH vs LESS ANTMAN (Voluntaryist Conference, 1983) *Libertarianism vs Electoral Politics.* (Two 60 min. tapes).

Smith argues that all political action leads to violation of individual rights and invasive acts. This, says Smith, includes voting for political candidates. Less Antman, former editor of the Libertarian Party's state-wide publication, *Caliber* rebuts Smith by saying that political libertarianism is the only way to educate the public.

306 A & B. DEBATE: WENDY MCELROY (author and writer) vs **JEFF HUMMEL** (Libertarian Party activist), debates *Non-voting vs Electoral Politics.* (Two 60 min. tapes).

Continuing with the 1983 Voluntaryist Conference at Cal. State Long Beach. McElroy and Jeff Hummel prove to be worthy opponents. Jeff Hummel says that political voting or running for office is not unlibertarian for strategic reasons, and that not all members of the state are liable for their governments' actions.

McElroy counters saying that government and its members (bureacrats, soldiers, elected officials, etc.) can be held responsible, even if they did not engage in aggressive acts. A real philosophical mind-bender.
